Outside of the lab, Stephanie is passionate about public science advocacy and education. She helped establish and currently directs McLean Hospital's "Brains Matter" program, a science education and outreach program focused on neuroscience research.

"I'm excited for the opportunity to expand BRAD even further and help encourage and empower my peers to become advocates for their own research efforts," Stephanie explained. "My biggest hope is that by encouraging public science education and advocacy within the neuroscience and neuropharmacology domain, we can help restore faith in science, help ensure the future of scientific progress and make gains towards reducing the stigma surrounding mental illness."
